Mutemwa Leprosy Care Centre

Many years ago, when we were living in South Africa, my husband and I, together with members of the Third Order of the Society of St Francis, went to stay at Silveira House (a Jesuit Centre for religious training and education in Zimbabwe). It was here that we learnt about **Mutemwa** and **John Bradburne**.

Mutemwa means *outcast* in the Shona language.

It is home to some 30 people suffering from leprosy - those who have been shunned by society.

John Bradburne (1921–1979) was born in Skirwith (near Penrith) in Cumbria. He was a Captain in the 9th Gurkha Rifles in the Second World War.

After many years travelling and searching, he found 'the place that God wanted him to be' – living alongside men and women suffering with leprosy in Mutemwa, Southern Rhodesia (now known as Zimbabwe), a place he helped transform into a community of peace, joy and love. John has come to be described as a hermit, a poet and a musician, a joker and a mystic, and a theologian... and a bee keeper! Read on...

World Bee Day 2024

May 20th marks World Bee Day, a day to celebrate the vital role bees play in our ecosystem. World Bee Day aims to promote actions that protect bees and their

habitats, as well as to acknowledge the vital role of beekeepers and other stakeholders in ensuring their conservation. It's a great opportunity to learn about the importance of bees, their challenges, and what we can do to support them.

John Bradburne lived for ten years with the lepers - he



knew everyone by name and he ministered to them, feeding them, talking with them, sharing with them the love of Jesus - the one of universal Love.

And he withdrew to his little tin hut to be with God.

"It seems my mission is to bees only, to tell them that we men want to forget their stings and our own fear and avarice and to be friends with bees and the rest of creation." JRB 1969.

Bees regularly visited John in swarms wherever he stayed. He welcomed them into his home, and he valued their

presence, as it kept visitors away, so he could get on with his writing and meditation'.

Today the bees came in
With a humming merry din

And settled in their swarm amidst my hive;

Til meridian they waited

And then they celebrated

The fact that in this cell is man alive:

Alive to solitude,

Dead to the world - intrude

Let none who with my sunny solitude would strive.

'Bees have become synonymous with John Bradburne. So the next time you pray, think of John and his bees, and don't be surprised if some bees start buzzing around!'

During the civil war of 1979 John Bradburne was kidnapped and murdered. But Mutemba lives on and so does John's presence and commitment.

Happy World Bee Day (that is, when it comes around again next year on the 20th May.)

We saw the acclaimed actor **Andrew Harrison in** the role of Dutch Catholic priest **Henri Nouwen** but that was not all. His one man show introduced us to a myriad of characters, needing numerous accents from different countries, some folk highly academic and others delightfully neuro-diverse.


An involuntary standing ovation from an emotional audience at the end was no less than the solitary actor deserved. From the start, when he tested our faith as he gazed above and beyond the audience, fixing his eyes on an imaginary Rembrandt painting of **The Return of the Prodigal Son**, a key theme throughout his complex life and the people among whom he lived, loved and worked, including L'Arche communities.

Devoid of any props, wardrobe, theatrical lighting Andrew Harrison brought so many relationships to life on a blank stage via his role shifts, in an incredible (or should I say credible) way! Holding an audience of about 140 people enthralled in an interval-free 80 minute performance was both moving and memorable.

A marvellous production that I find impossible to do justice to in words. It has led me to borrow books on the life of Henri Nouwen (thanks to your dear Editor)

and if I had a chance to see the play again I would seize it!


