From the Minister

What do you think when you look at the image on the front of this Newsletter? It was shared by our friends at Penge Salvation Army.

Last month I used another image they had shared which said, "The Church has left the building". I said I didn't think it was a sad image because it represents an opportunity for us not just to think outside of the box, but literally to step outside of the box of our church building. We can't come together for "church" on Sunday morning; and maybe this helps us to think of "church" as something that we are part of at all times. I would go further and say that maybe we should stop thinking of church as something we do on Sundays, and start thinking of worshipping God as something we do all the time; of our faith as something we feel and live.

Maybe this is what this month's image, on the front cover, tells us too? If we think of our relationship with Jesus as a living, vital thing that we experience all the time, then we are church, in the sense of being the Living Stones Peter speaks of, wherever we are. We are never alone, even in lockdown, because we have Jesus with us in our hearts all the time. And of course, as all of us who have received the gift of the Holy Spirit are God's children and part of his family, we are the Body of Christ whether we are physically together or not.

I think of the words of the writer of Ecclesiastes: "Two people can accomplish twice as much as one... If one person fails, the other can reach out and help... A person standing alone can be attacked and defeated, but two can stand back to back and conquer. Three are even better for a triple-braided cord cannot easily be broken". Just as we believe in the God as the Trinity, three in one, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, we can also see ourselves as church in terms of that triple braided cord: Jesus, ourselves and one another.

Right at the end of this month, we celebrate the Day of Pentecost when the promise Jesus made to his disciples was fulfilled. You may remember reading about this promise on the last Sunday in April at the end of Luke 24. "And now I will send the Holy Spirit just as my Father promised. Stay here in the city until the Holy Spirit comes and fills you with power from heaven". If you read through the Scripture readings you will find later on in this newsletter, you will find the account of the Day of Pentecost, when the Spirit descended in tongues of flame on each believer. I have added a second reading, from 1 Corinthians, where Paul reminds us that we have all been baptised into Christ's body by one Spirit and we have all received the same Spirit.

Maybe the Lord will grant that we can meet again and celebrate Pentecost together. But, if he doesn't, well, we are all part of that one Body where we are. We are all part of that tripe-braided cord which cannot easily be broken. The Holy Spirit which is in all our hearts binds us together in a fellowship that can't be broken by a mere virus.

May the Lord bless you and protect you.

May the Lord smile on you and be gracious to you. May the Lord show you his favour and give you his peace.

It was pretty cold and we were well wrapped up, when a man dressed only in shorts and foot ware came running past. We still managed to unravel and devour some birthday cake at the end of the walk.

The funeral was on 16th April and a very strange event it was. Due to Covid 19 restrictions we could only have nine mourners. Mum had placed a bunch of primroses on the coffin. Picked from their garden from an area he used to burn his bonfires.

Dad was welcomed into the chapel to the theme tune of BBC

Snooker Championship. He was a real fan of snooker, going back to Pot Black. He attended his local village hall snooker afternoon and one at the church he attended. We sang 'What a friend we have in Jesus' and later 'How great Thou art', his favourite. The Grand and Great Grandchildren had put together a video of their memories in poem form. It was a



teary moment. The service was a real joyous occasion as we

celebrated his life and the journey he was now on in the presence of his Lord.

The minister who conducted the service wrote to mum a few days later expressing how dad's funeral was just the tonic he needed. He had a particularly trying week and the joy and celebration of a true and faithful servant was a great pick me up. As we left the chapel we departed to the hymn' We shall go out with joy and be led forth with peace, and the mountains and the hills shall break forth before you, and the trees and the fields shall clap their hands, and the trees of the field shall clap their hands'. There was an impromptu clapping as we envisaged Dad arriving at his final destination with all the angels welcoming him home.

We are unable to hold services at the moment because of the Coronavirus regulations. But before the lockdown, the Worship Team met to plan services for April to June. So here are the readings we had planned for each Sunday in May, and a couple of things for you to think about after reading each one.

<u>Sunday 3rd May</u>

John 10:1-18 New Living Translation

10 "I tell you the truth, anyone who sneaks over the wall of a sheepfold, rather than going through the gate, must surely be a thief and a robber! ² But the one who enters through the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. ³The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep recognize his voice and come to him. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. ⁴After he has gathered his own flock, he walks ahead of them, and they follow him because they know his voice. ⁵They won't follow a stranger; they will run from him because they don't know his voice."

⁶ Those who heard Jesus use this illustration didn't understand what he meant, ⁷ so he explained it to them: "I tell you the truth, I am the gate for the sheep. ⁸ All who came before me^[a] were thieves and robbers. But the true sheep did not listen to them. ⁹Yes, I am the gate. Those who come in through me will be saved.^[b] They will come and go freely and will find good pastures. ¹⁰ The thief's purpose is to steal and kill and destroy. My purpose is to give them a rich and satisfying life.

¹¹ "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd sacrifices his life for the sheep. ¹² A hired hand will run when he sees a wolf coming. He will abandon the sheep because they don't belong to him and he isn't their shepherd. And so the wolf attacks them and scatters the flock. ¹³ The hired hand runs away because he's working only for the money and doesn't really care about the sheep.

¹⁴ "I am the good shepherd; I know my own sheep, and they know me, ¹⁵ just as my Father knows me and I know the Father. So I sacrifice my life for the sheep. ¹⁶ I have other sheep, too, that are not in this sheepfold. I must bring them also. They will listen to my voice, and there will be one flock with one shepherd.

¹⁷ "The Father loves me because I sacrifice my life so I may take it back again. ¹⁸ No one can take my life from me. I sacrifice it voluntarily. For I have the authority to lay it down when I want to and also to take it up again. For this is what my Father has commanded."

Reflect:

A good Middle Eastern shepherd always leads the sheep; he never drives them. What does this tell you about the relationship Jesus wants to have with us? Verse 8: What do you think this means? Verse 18: Jesus died freely for us. The resurrection wasn't an afterthought: the tomb couldn't contain God. How does this make you feel?

Sunday 10th May:

John 14:1-14 New Living Translation (NLT)

14 "Don't let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God, and trust also in me. ²There is more than enough room in my Father's home.^[a] If this were not so, would I have told you that I am going to prepare a place for you?^{[b] 3} When everything is ready, I will come and get you, so that you will always be with me where I am. ⁴And you know the way to where I am going." ⁵ "No, we don't know, Lord," Thomas said. "We have no idea where you are going, so how can we know the way?" ⁶ Jesus told him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me. ⁷ If you had really known me, you would know who my Father is.^[C] From now on, you do know him and have seen him!"

⁸ Philip said, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied."

⁹ Jesus replied, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and yet you still don't know who I am? Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father! So why are you asking me to show him to you? ¹⁰ Don't you believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words I speak are not my own, but my Father who lives in me does his work through me. ¹¹ Just believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me. Or at least believe because of the work you have seen me do.

¹² "I tell you the truth, anyone who believes in me will do the same works I have done, and even greater works, because I am going to be with the Father. ¹³ You can ask for anything in my name, and I will do it, so that the Son can bring glory to the Father. ¹⁴ Yes, ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it!

Reflect:

The disciples were troubled because Jesus told them he would only be with them a little longer. What does Jesus tell them will bring reassurance? (Verse 1)

Verse 9: Jesus didn't just teach about God: he was God-in-theflesh. This was at the root of the opposition Jesus encountered from the religious leaders.

Verse 13-14: How does this amazing promise make you feel?

<u>Sunday 17th May</u>

John 14:15-21 New Living Translation (NLT)

¹⁵ "If you love me, obey^[a] my commandments. ¹⁶ And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate,^[b] who will never leave you. ¹⁷ He is the Holy Spirit, who leads into all truth. The world cannot receive him, because it isn't looking for him and doesn't recognize him. But you know him, because he lives with you now and later will be in you.^[c] ¹⁸ No, I will not abandon you as orphans—I will come to you. ¹⁹ Soon the world will no longer see me, but you will see me. Since I live, you also will live. ²⁰ When I am raised to life again, you will know that I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in you. ²¹ Those who accept my commandments and obey them are the ones who love me. And because they love me, my Father will love them. And I will love them and reveal myself to each of them."

Reflect:

Verse 15: What do we have to do to receive the Holy Spirit? Verses 17-18: The Holy Spirit is a constant presence in the heart of every Christian. We are sustained by his constant presence, a great comfort especially at this time of lockdown. Verse 20: the resurrection inaugurated Jesus' spiritual union with his disciples, and this includes all of us, which is parallel with his union with God. Doesn't that fill your heart with praise and wonder?

Sunday 24th May. Ascension Sunday

Acts 1:1-11 New Living Translation (NLT)

1 In my first book^[a] I told you, Theophilus, about everything Jesus began to do and teach ² until the day he was taken up to heaven after giving his chosen apostles further instructions through the Holy Spirit. ³ During the forty days after he suffered and died, he appeared to the apostles from time to time, and he proved to them in many ways that he was

actually alive. And he talked to them about the Kingdom of God.

⁴Once when he was eating with them, he commanded them, "Do not leave Jerusalem until the Father sends you the gift he promised, as I told you before. ⁵John baptized with^[b] water, but in just a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit."

The Ascension of Jesus

⁶So when the apostles were with Jesus, they kept asking him, "Lord, has the time come for you to free Israel and restore our kingdom?"

⁷ He replied, "The Father alone has the authority to set those dates and times, and they are not for you to know. ⁸ But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be my witnesses, telling people about me everywhere—in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

⁹ After saying this, he was taken up into a cloud while they were watching, and they could no longer see him. ¹⁰ As they strained to see him rising into heaven, two white-robed men suddenly stood among them. ¹¹ "Men of Galilee," they said, "why are you standing here staring into heaven? Jesus has been taken from you into heaven, but someday he will return from heaven in the same way you saw him go!"

Reflect:

Verses 3-5: Jesus is teaching the disciples about the Kingdom of God. How does it make you feel to be a citizen of the Kingdom?

Verse 8: Jesus wants us to witness for him. The gospel is for everyone everywhere and the Holy Spirit is the source of power for all this evangelism.

Verse 11:Jesus had gone into heaven. The witnesses were left on earth but they were part of God's Kingdom too.

<u>Sunday 31st May. Pentecost</u>

Acts 2:1-21 New Living Translation (NLT)

2 On the day of Pentecost^[a] all the believers were meeting together in one place. ²Suddenly, there was a sound from heaven like the roaring of a mighty windstorm, and it filled the house where they were sitting. ³Then, what looked like flames or tongues of fire appeared and settled on each of them. ⁴And everyone present was filled with the Holy Spirit and began speaking in other languages,^[b] as the Holy Spirit gave them this ability.

⁵ At that time there were devout Jews from every nation living in Jerusalem. ⁶ When they heard the loud noise, everyone came running, and they were bewildered to hear their own languages being spoken by the believers.

⁷They were completely amazed. "How can this be?" they exclaimed. "These people are all from Galilee, ⁸ and yet we hear them speaking in our own native languages! ⁹Here we are—Parthians, Medes, Elamites, people from Mesopotamia, Judea, Cappadocia, Pontus, the province of Asia, ¹⁰Phrygia, Pamphylia, Egypt, and the areas of Libya around Cyrene, visitors from Rome ¹¹ (both Jews and converts to Judaism), Cretans, and Arabs. And we all hear these people speaking in our own languages about the wonderful things God has done!" ¹²They stood there amazed and perplexed. "What can this mean?" they asked each other.

¹³ But others in the crowd ridiculed them, saying, "They're just drunk, that's all!"

Peter Preaches to the Crowd

¹⁴Then Peter stepped forward with the eleven other apostles and shouted to the crowd, "Listen carefully, all of you, fellow Jews and residents of Jerusalem! Make no mistake about this. ¹⁵These people are not drunk, as some of you are assuming. Nine o'clock in the morning is much too early for that. ¹⁶No, what you see was predicted long ago by the prophet Joel:

¹⁷ 'In the last days,' God says,

'I will pour out my Spirit upon all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy.

Your young men will see visions,

and your old men will dream dreams.

¹⁸ In those days I will pour out my Spirit even on my servants—men and women alike and they will prophesy.

¹⁹ And I will cause wonders in the heavens above and signs on the earth below—

blood and fire and clouds of smoke.

²⁰ The sun will become dark,

and the moon will turn blood red

before that great and glorious day of the Lord arrives.

²¹ But everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.'^[c]

<u>1 Corinthians 12:3-13</u> New Living Translation (NLT)

³So I want you to know that no one speaking by the Spirit of God will curse Jesus, and no one can say Jesus is Lord, except by the Holy Spirit.

⁴There are different kinds of spiritual gifts, but the same Spirit is the source of them all. ⁵There are different kinds of service, but we serve the same Lord. ⁶God works in different ways, but it is the same God who does the work in all of us.

⁷A spiritual gift is given to each of us so we can help each other. ⁸To one person the Spirit gives the ability to give wise advice^[a]; to another the same Spirit gives a message of special knowledge.^[b] ⁹The same Spirit gives great faith to another, and to someone else the one Spirit gives the gift of healing. ¹⁰He gives one person the power to perform miracles, and another the ability to prophesy. He gives someone else the ability to discern whether a message is from the Spirit of God or from another spirit. Still another person is given the ability to speak in unknown languages,^[c] while another is given the ability to interpret what is being said. ¹¹ It is the one and only Spirit who distributes all these gifts. He alone decides which gift each person should have.

One Body with Many Parts

¹² The human body has many parts, but the many parts make up one whole body. So it is with the body of Christ. ¹³ Some of us are Jews, some are Gentiles,^[d] some are slaves, and some are free. But we have all been baptized into one body by one Spirit, and we all share the same Spirit.^[e]

Reflect:

On the Day of Pentecost, pilgrims from all over the known world were in Jerusalem so everyone there could witness the power of the Holy Spirit. And we have the promise in verse 21 that everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved. In 1 Corinthians, Paul tells us that we demonstrate we have the Holy Spirit by proclaiming the truth that Jesus is Lord. We all have different gifts from the Spirit but in verse 6, Paul tells us that the work we do for God is in fact God working through us.

Verse 7: Spiritual gifts aren't given to us for our benefit but so we can help one another. So what does that tell you about our relationship with one another as the church?

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
