His thoughts on the passing seasons...

t has come to that time of year when our surroundings turn from green to those oranges, yellows and rustic browns. I love this time of



year as the trees change and give us a few weeks of a colourful display before going to sleep for winter.

The chill in the air and when the sun is out the sharpness of landscapes, which are great for the camera.

My allotment has produced some good fruit this year with an abundant crop of greengages and plums. I did reasonably well for rhubarb, and it was a good year for tomatoes.

Carrie and I were very busy in the kitchen making jams and tomato chutney. We had so many that we ran out of jars.

As I write I have spent the morning on the allotment as the weather forecaster stated it would be sunny with maybe a light shower. Fortunately for me she was correct. The plot is starting to look somewhat sad as

everything finishes producing crops and the plants die off.

Or do they die off?

I planted leeks this year which didn't do very well, most bolted, which is basically when they get stressed and shoot up a long stem before they are fully grown. It may have been due to lack of water during that dry spell in the summer. I was on holiday at the time and left my plot to be tended to by, ok... I won't name and shame but perhaps the leeks didn't get the water required.

Now there's a thing, perhaps when we feel stressed, we should have a drink of water. If it works for plants maybe humans!

I digress. Getting back to the dead looking leek. As I lifted the plant with a fork, I noticed around the base a green shoot coming out of a bulb. Most of my remaining leeks all had this formation. I carefully prized them off the main plant and put to one side.

This was new life forming from the parent plant. I've replanted about a dozen of these new plants to see how they get on. I normally grow leeks from seed.

hen we become Christians very often someone more mature in their faith has sown the seed which has generated an inquisitiveness sufficient for us to enquire and make searching questions until we ask Jesus into our lives. We feed off those who are already on their Christian

journey. Like the shoot we grow by feeding off the main plant and gradually mature.

This is one of the reasons why we come together at church, to be among other Christians and learn from Bible teaching and people's experiences and testimony. We do however have a far better main plant to lean on than our Christian friends, this being the **Holy Spirit**.

The Spirit helps us with wisdom, understanding, counsel, power, knowledge and fear of the Lord.

If we grow in these then the fruit produced in us will show in our love, joy, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self control. (Galatians 5: 22-23).

Enjoy these last few days before winter sets in and take a moment to marvel at the change of God's creation.

His creation never goes to sleep and like the squirrels that were busy today collecting acorns for the winter storage we too, as disciples, are to keep busy in God's work, leading others to ask Jesus into their lives.

Oh, and just a reminder Christmas is just around the corner.

ey everyone, it's Siobhan. Missing you all up here in the cold North.

I thought I'd share an update on what I'm up to.

The PhD is going well. I am writing and reading a lot about other people who write and read a lot in multiple languages and multiple places. Moving from one place to another is both hard and inspiring for writers and I am slowly finding out how different people express that.

I'm also now president of a student society, **Inclusive Christian Movement Durham.** We are working to create an inclusive, welcoming, and affirming home for Christians in Durham, especially those who don't get such a positive welcome in other Christian groups, such as LGBTQ+ Christians. It's challenging – we're a very small society at the moment. But things are looking positive.

At **Fresher's Fair**, where new students come each year to find out about new societies they could join, we handed out over 40 flyers and even had some non-Christian students come up and say they were really glad we were there.

Coming up, we have a welcome lunch hosted by Durham City Methodists, a prayerful walk around Durham, a talk about supporting refugees, exciting events with other faith groups for interfaith week, and a Trans Day of Remembrance Service. It would be so great if you can pray for us – that we can grow and that LGBTQ+ Christians in Durham would feel welcomed, affirmed and loved.



MEMORIES ON A PLATE!

ospitality and home-baking is surely something common to all CTiB and, way back in 1999, I edited a book of recipes from the congregation of St. George's. In the Intro I wrote that, despite the lure of a pristine new cook book, the recipes that mean most to us are those handed down and hoarded in original form because they are written in a dear, familiar hand or may evoke precious memories of people and occasions that are special to us.



"They melt in the mouth" declared my friend who enjoyed the few biscuits like these in the photo which I took her recently when she was recovering from surgery. The story of these biscuits goes back nearly 50 years when I was in Stone Park Maternity Home with my second son and a dear colleague from Woman's Weekly visited me, bearing a half empty

tin of her homemade Hungarian Chocolate Biscuits. "I dropped it at the bus stop in Brixton" she confessed "and I didn't dare scoop them up off the pavement for you"! Later, enjoying the remnants so much, I regretted her attention to Health and Safety, knowing the antibiotics I was on would probably have kept me safe!

So popular did that recipe become, passed on to her from a staff artist on the magazine, and quickly begged by me when I was back home, that it featured regularly as the NCT support group coffee mornings were held at members' homes. One of my go-to baking choices as it was so simple and reliable.

Five years ago I visited one of those friends now living in Penzance as we celebrated our significant birthdays and not only had she baked some for old times' sake but also showed me the recipe appeared as her grandson's contribution to a fundraising calendar of recipes for his school!

More recently I met another NCT friend from the 70s as we delightedly recognised each other at the bus stop. During a hurried chat, catching up on the 194, she said her daughter had recently asked her for the recipe for those biscuits! So heartwarming somehow and I felt compelled to dig out my old typewritten, faded, stained copy to make some to take to my very closest NCT friend who today complimented them as above!

I love the idea that such a simple recipe has been shared with friends, handed down, not just to our own grown-up children but also to the next generation! Happy memories from a significant time in our lives.

If this has whetted your appetite, perhaps you might like the recipe which follows.

HUNGARIAN CHOCOLATE BISCUTS

4 oz margarine (or butter), 2 oz caster sugar, half teaspoon vanilla essence, 4 oz S.R flour, half an oz of cocoa powder.

Cream fat and sugar together with essence. Sieve flour and cocoa and add to fat and sugar. Roll into 20 balls the size of small walnuts and place on greased baking sheets, allowing room for spreading. Flatten with a fork dipped in cold water. Bake at Gas mark 4

for 12 minutes.

Church meeting update

The next Church meeting will be in **January** - date to be provided soon!

We had a Church meeting on 20th October which was very well attended.

These were the headlines

Church Hall and Memorial Room

Due to the large cracks these rooms are totally out of action now.

The nursery school (**Smiling Faces**) have moved into the Kenilworth Hall.

We have taken advice from an architect to think about how we could rebuild. We would initially need to get **planning permission** and take this in small steps.

We agreed unanimously to submit the initial plans to the **council** and then have a wider meeting with the architect about the possibilities.

Lots of details will need to be decided and various options are around for funding this.

It will be a big project and aim to benefit the community and bring in an income for the church in the future.

We remember of course that the church is not the building but it is the people!

Disabled access

We had some funding for a **stair lift** from the church to the halls (the halls are on a level of about 4 steps up from the church).

But what we really need is access for **mobility vehicles** to go from the church to the halls. which is approximately 3 times the price. When we get some written quotes this can be discussed further.
